
Local Government is big business

- The Queensland local government sector
 - Employs 42,000 people
 - Maintains \$150 billion in assets
 - Delivers \$12 billion in services
 - For 5.1 million Queenslanders
- If Qld Councils were listed on the ASX, they'd be as big as Aurizon, Bank of Queensland & Suncorp combined.



Financing Local Government


Federal Financial Assistance Grants (FAGs)



- FAGs to Councils have declined over three decades, from 1% of tax revenue to 0.55% today.
- Of your tax
 - 80% goes to Feds
 - 17% goes to State
 - 3% goes to Council
- Yet Councils maintains 33% of all public assets.

State vs Local Government debt




- State borrowings set to hit \$65 B, from \$55 B last financial year.
- Financial sustainability of many Queensland Councils is becoming a challenge.

Social profile

- State of the Regions Report ranks Wide Bay as having Australia's worst unemployment, 19/20 past years.
- All Wide Bay Councils ranked in the bottom third of Queensland Councils in terms of social disadvantage.
- More residents on pensions, with a disability, and lower incomes than state average.



Social profile

- Best place in Australia to live, but
 - 38% households on less than \$745pw (28% regional QLD)
 - 8.7% with a disability (5.5% regional QLD)
 - 11.6% on Job Seeker (7.6 regional QLD)
 - 40% Fraser Coast on pension (20% regional QLD)



Federal investment

Following cashless debit card in 2018:

- Hinkler Regional Deal between both Councils and Federal Government in March 2019
- Only Deal in Australia without the state participating
- Federal promise of infrastructure to address social disadvantage, drive economic development and improve liveability & lifestyle
- Two-thirds of \$172M (over 5 yrs) promised before last Federal election went to state-federal road projects
- Most of the rest to projects such as Hervey Bay City Centre





Wide Bay Burnett projects of significance



- \$1.5B new Bundaberg Hospital (2026+)
- Hervey Bay Hospital upgrades needed
- \$1.2 B to repair Paradise Dam
- Urban water security needed for Hervey Bay
- De-merge Port of Bundaberg from Gladstone Ports Corporation

Wide Bay Burnett projects of significance



- Inland Rail to connect to North Coast Line - 24,000 more jobs in Wide Bay
- Mineral projects in North and South Burnett – export opportunities
- Telecommunications connectivity – reducing the ‘digital tax’

- Tourism and aviation




- Tourism and Hervey Bay marina infrastructure

- What about professional and business services




- Take advantage of COVID-19 talent exodus from NSW and VIC


